## From Our Executive Director:

Dear Friends of Interfaith,
We announce the public phase of our Fortifying Families' Future Capital Campaign.
Early last year, we learned that we might lose our lease on our core shelter building in downtown Everett. The former Dominican Convent we had leased for 22 years might go up for sale
 in the next few years.
The Interfaith Family Shelter Board decided not to wait for the "For Sale" sign and made an offer to Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church to purchase the site. In November 2021, we signed a purchase-and-sale agreement for $\$ 1,500,000$ with the Catholic Archdiocese to purchase the site of our current shelter.

I am happy to report that with an \$800,000 capital budget request stewarded by 38th Legislative District Representatives Emily Wicks and Mike Sells and 38th Legislative District Senator June Robinson, we are well on our way to raising the $\$ 1.6$ million needed to buy the property.

This is a win for families experiencing homelessness in Snohomish County. We hope to continue providing a warm safe room children and their parents struggling to find housing in our community.

Our incredible Capital Campaign Committee, led by Don Whitfield and Jesse Deason, has raised pledges for over $\$ 140,000$ so far, and look forward to support from the City of Everett and Snohomish County Human Services.

The capital campaign to purchase the main Family Shelter building and site from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church is now underway!

We have leased our main shelter from the parish since 1999, and the church now plans to sell the building. Purchasing the Family Shelter will ensure that this vital and efficient program continues to operate and continue serving families.
We need to raise a total of $\$ 1.6$ million. And we have already received $\$ 43,400$ in donations and $\$ 940,600$ in pledges.

## Partner Spotlight: Trust-based Support

Earlier this year, the Interfaith Family Shelter was proactively selected by the Puget Sound Energy Foundation (PSEF) as the recipient of a trust-based philanthropy program. Among a handful of other regional nonprofits, Interfaith was recognized as an "exceptional nonprofit organization leading the way in the prevention and elimination of homelessness throughout PSE's 10-county service area."

This unique philanthropic approach focuses on an organization's core aspirations, principles, and best practices. It reflects PSE's commitment to help local communities and support programs that benefit those experiencing homelessness by providing pathways to home ownership. Unlike competitive grants, trust-based philanthropy involves an in-depth examination of carefully pre-selected

## Donor Spotlight: <br> Gibby Home Fire Prevention

"Thank you for letting us perhaps save a life," says Gerry Gibson. "Seven people die every day in home fires, almost all of these are preventable. Smoke alarms save lives."

Gibby Home Fire Prevention (GHFP) was formed after the Gibsons lost their son, Greg, in a fire at a rental house that had no smoke alarms. Since then, GHFP has advocated for fire safety information, and also installed free smoke alarms. Their efforts led to the Greg "Gibby" Gibson Home Fire Safety Act, which enforces smoke alarm and fire safety among landlords, and promotes fire safety education.

In December '21, GHFP installed their
